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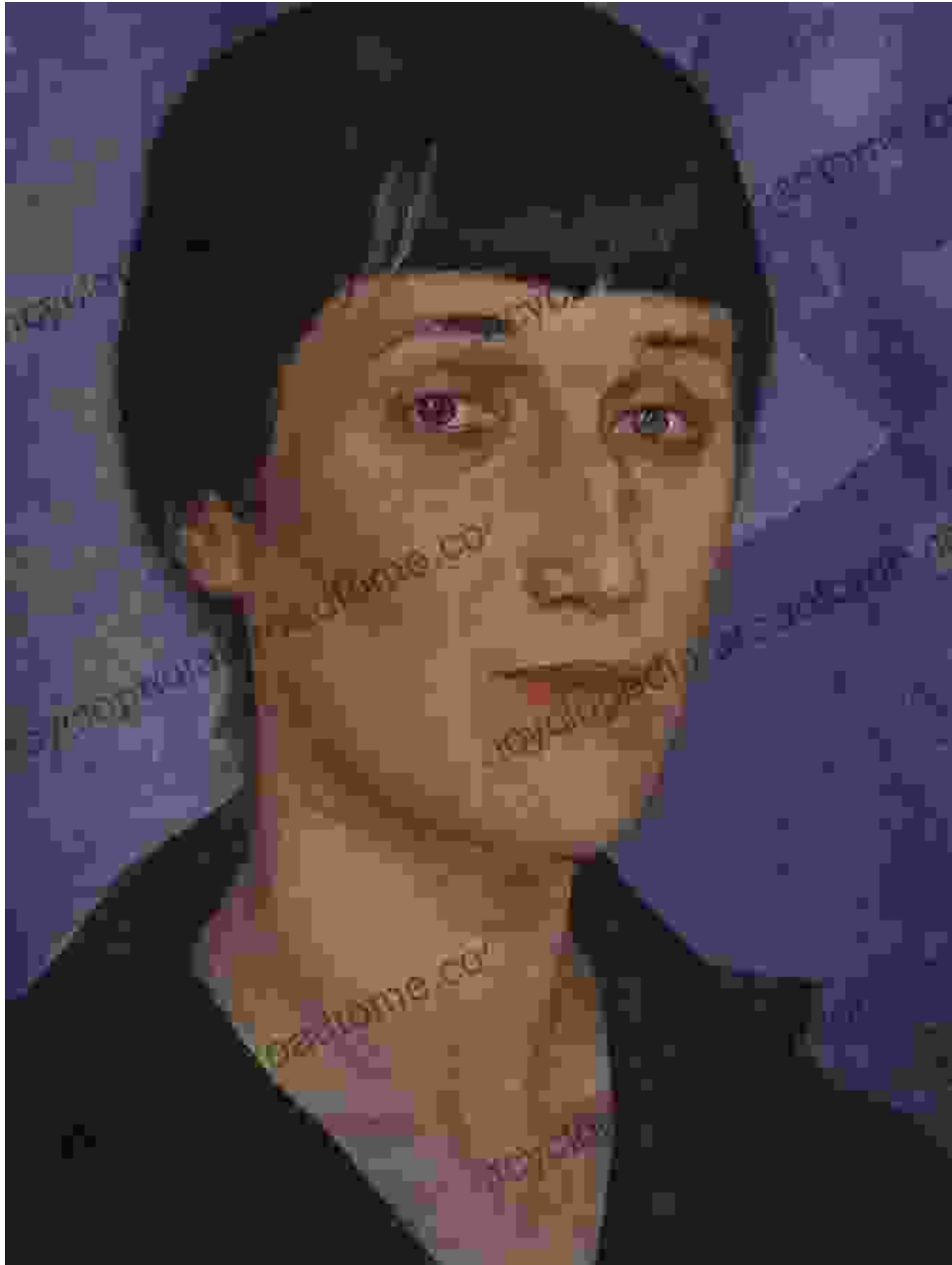
Valery Bryusov: The Trailblazer of Symbolism

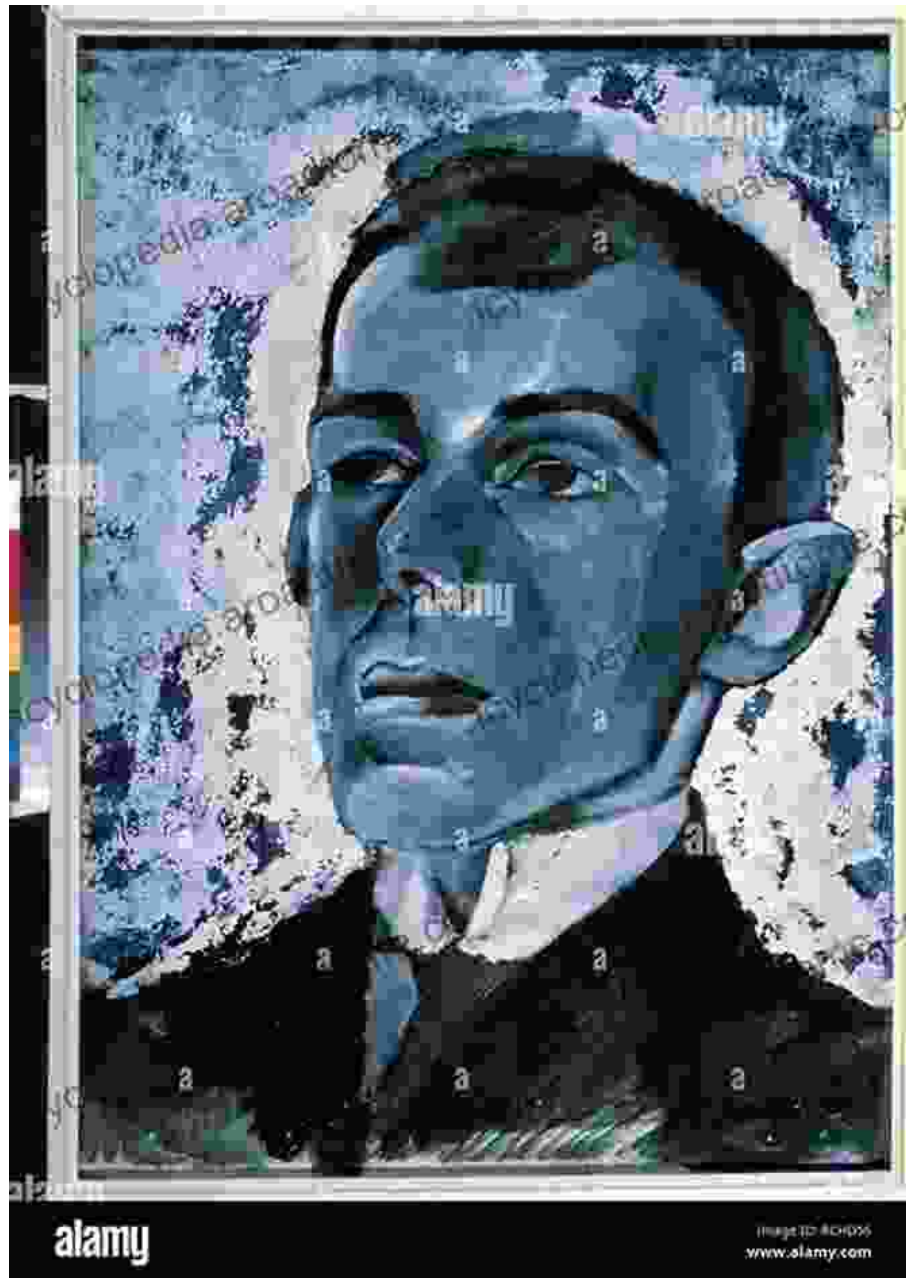
Anna Akhmatova: The Voice of Love and Loss
